INTRODUCTION & METHODOLOGY

From February 17 to 23, 2022, DHM Research conducted a survey of Oregon voters. The purpose of the survey was to assess voter priorities in the upcoming 2022 elections as well as their opinions on a range of topics including climate change, public safety and crime, homelessness, earthquakes, wildfires, and water.

Research Methodology: The survey consisted of 600 Oregon voters and took approximately 16 minutes to complete. This is a sufficient sample size to assess voter opinions generally and to review findings by multiple subgroups.

Respondents were contacted from a list of registered voters in Oregon. Telephone respondents were contacted by a live interviewer and text-to-online respondents received a text invitation directing them to an online survey. In gathering responses, a variety of quality control measures were employed, including questionnaire pre-testing and validation. Quotas were set by age, gender, race, educational attainment, area of the state, and political party registration to ensure a representative sample.

Statement of Limitations: Any sampling of opinions or attitudes is subject to a margin of error. The margin of error is a standard statistical calculation that represents differences between the sample and total population at a confidence interval, or probability, calculated to be 95%. This means that there is a 95% probability that the sample taken for this study would fall within the stated margin of error if compared with the results achieved from surveying the entire population. The margin of error for this survey is $\pm 4.0\%$.
